charges of murder, assault with a deadly weapon, possession of a firearm by a felon and six counts of assault with a deadly weapon with minors present.

Jones is charged in the 12:40 a.m. killing of Albert Charles Parisi Jr., 31, and the injury of Tyshawn Robert Viera, 30, at 278 Connie Court near McKay Street and Ray Road in Spring Lake. Parisi was pronounced dead at the scene. Viera was taken to Cape Fear Valley Hospital with an apparent gunshot wound to the abdomen, according to dispatch radio traffic. The news release lists Parisi's address as Dimaggio Drive in Spring Lake, but an obituary indicates he is from Sanford.

Jones, whose address was not given, goes by the names
